**Objective:** The objective is to develop a restaurant or food truck website using HTML and CSS and give an in-person presentation that demonstrates how your website meets the rubric requirements.

#### **Entries and Judging**

Participants: MCS has a maximum of 20 time slots for teams of 1 to 2.

**Submission:** Websites are to be designed in Web Lab in Code.org. URL from code.org must be submitted to MCS using the Submission Form by March 27, 2025. In-person presentations will take place at FunFest during scheduled times.

**Determining the winner:** Final judging will combine the Project Rubric and Presentation Rubric to determine the competition winner.

### **Competition Rules**

Students will develop a website using HTML/CSS, the text provided, pictures, and any additional text as needed. Students are responsible for finding their own pictures and adhering to copyright laws

The website must include the following:

- 1. 3 separate pages
- 2. 2-3 images on each page that are relevant to the topic
- 3. The website must use at least 8 HTML tags and 8 CSS style rules.
- 4. All images must have attribution information
- 5. Students are allowed to use resources for help:
  - a. <a href="https://code.org">https://code.org</a>
  - b. https://www.w3schools.com

Please remember to publish your website prior to submission

Teams will present in person at FunFest beginning at 9:30am in a 2-minute presentation. 2 minutes is the maximum time for a team presentation, the judges will stop teams at the 2-minute mark if they are still presenting.

#### Presentation should cover:

- 1. Introduction
- 2. Basis for Subject Choice/What Problem the Site Solves or Info it Provides
- 3. How the Website was Created/Basic Demo
- 4. Conclusion.
